

First Responders

Summer seems to have started nice and early this year. Hopefully the good weather will continue. As many of you will be aware, your South Central Ambulance Service NHS Foundation Trusts Community First Responder Team remains active in the local area. We respond to life-threatening 999 emergency calls. We are sent by the Ambulance Service as an additional resource.

If you are not aware of the service we hope that the support of the local volunteer team means that help reaches those unfortunately in need of our services as soon as possible. As an example the chance of surviving a cardiac arrest decrease 14% per minute before defibrillation occurs, meaning that every minute counts. The local presence and those few minutes can make a difference.

As usual we continue to ask for any unwanted new or used printer cartridges and mobile phones which we can recycle and add to our fundraising. Collection boxes are available in many locations including the village school, village shop and Charlbury doctor's surgery. 150th anniversary of Alice in Wonderland

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FINSTOCK VILLAGE HALL

The building contract awarded by the Parish Council followed a tender process and enables the group managing the hall redevelopment to deliver building work a full two months ahead of schedule. You are able to follow near real-time progress on the Village Hall Facebook page at www.facebook.com/finstockvillagehall. Please note that you do not need to be registered with Facebook to read the updates.

Shaun Morley, chair of the Village Hall trustees said, "We are excited at the prospect of a new village hall being built that is welcoming to users. Our efforts are now on ensuring it is fully equipped for use on opening day".

We will need continued financial support from the Parish Council and the community of Finstock through to the Beer Festival on September 12th to finish the £35,000 event fundraising required. The new building has been funded by Finstock Parish Council, community donations and fundraising, and many grants, most notable from WREN (Waste Recycling Environmental Limited), with funds donated by FCC Environment to the Landfill Communities Fund and WODC's Community Facilities grant.

We have received an award of £5,000 from the Cotswold Conservation Board (CCB) towards a solar water heating panel, SMART heating and lighting controls, benches and picnic tables for Well Hill, and other associated work. We

The village hall contract awarded have also received £1,000 from the Doris Field Trust towards the general rebuilding; the second grant in two years.

We have begun applying for grants to furnish and equip the hall under the project name **Realise the Potential of Finstock Village Hall**. Our first grant award from Cottsway Wellcommunity fund was for the £2,272 requested. This will fund the final kitchen white goods, internal and external notice boards, and additional small and larger tables. Many thanks to CCB, Doris Field and Cottsway.

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BRIBERY AND CORRUPTION

"Wine writers generally have a collective mindset of never having met a wine they didn't like".

It is an uncomfortable but irrefutable fact that nearly all wine publicity, including promotions, advertising, newspaper articles etc. are funded by winemakers themselves. This has provoked intemperate individuals like former wine writer Malcolm Gluck (author, 'The Great Wine Swindle') to claim that the world of wine is populated by 'liars, scroungers and cheats'. Gluck also used to be an advertising copywriter so certain allowances have to be made, but his point about winemakers paying for publicity is a valid one. Wine writers are the natural prey of winemakers. They all go on the same trips, tastings and dinners and are given plentiful free samples in the hope that they will write something favourable. You can see what Robert Parker was talking about.

However while subsidies by winemakers to promote sales are one thing, subsidies by Government agencies are quite another. If, like me, you had assumed that the EU would currently be far too preoccupied by bailouts and potential bankruptcies to worry about subsidising wine, think again.

The EU has increased the sum available for promoting wine to €1.15Bn for the period 2014-18. France's share has been drastically cut after one beneficiary presented a bill for €3,405 for 'informative travels for journalists' which turned out to be for three VIP tickets for the French Open Tennis Championships: which is not surprising but shows that some do not take it seriously.

The overall sum is still going to EU winemakers, which might make you pause for thought the next time you see a price cut applied to an EU wine. It rather takes the shine off if they are trying to bribe you with your own money.

Help keep our ducks healthy

The Canal and River Trust states that every year over six million loaves of bread are thrown into our canals and rivers by well-intentioned people feeding the ducks. However, this bread is not great for them or their habitats, and so they are asking you to swap the bread for healthy snacks and to exercise some portion control.

Feed ducks: birdseed, grapes, earthworms, mealworms, uncooked oats, rice, chopped lettuce or other green salad leaves. To learn more about feeding ducks or to visit canals and rivers this summer go to canalrivertrust.org.uk.

Compost for the Climate

2015 has been declared the International Year of Soils by the United Nations, making it the perfect time to start composting your food scraps to help rebuild soil health. Healthy soil stores carbon in the ground where it provides multiple benefits for climate stability, food security, and fresh water availability.

In a compost pile, food scraps decompose with the help of air, heat and microorganisms, eventually becoming healthy soil. Food in landfills, on the other hand, is compacted so tightly that it decomposes without oxygen, creating methane: a greenhouse



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gas with 23 times the global warming potential of carbon dioxide. Diverting your food scraps from the landfill to the compost pile is a low-cost, easy and effective way to help the climate. (tinyurl. com/mps8z27)

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County Councillor Reports

Implications from the General Election

Honours

Oxfordshire's Chief Fire Officer and the person responsible for managing the Olympic Torch route through the County was named in the Queen's New Year's Honours list. David Etheridge, who joined Oxfordshire County Council's Fire and Rescue Service 28 years ago, has been made an OBE while County Network Co-ordinator Katherine Powley has been awarded the MBE.

Bus Services

Service X10 (Pelham's Coaches: Wychwood – Burford shuttle)

Service continues, but final evening peak journey from Burford withdrawn along with single lunchtime round trip. There are still some services that are under review.

Implications from the General Election

In the run up to the General Election David Cameron made it very plain that deficit reduction would be the main promise made to the country. Most people will know that defence, health and education will be well protected from the cuts, but to save extra billions that are being talked about will leave a heavy burden for local government, especially for those Councils responsible for Adult Services and Child Protection.

Currently we spend 50% of our annual £600million revenue budget on Adult and Child Care and, it is interesting to note that this is spent on only 2% of the Oxfordshire population. It is projected that by 2020 75% of our budget will be spent in this area.

We will be attempting to streamline and improve such things as Children's Centres, but it is fair to say that such things as supported transport, highways maintenance, external grants and other such items will be left to carry the brunt of the cuts we will need to make at County Hall.

FINSTOCK PRE-SCHOOL

We had a surprise visitor on the second day of term 5: an OFSTED (Office for Standards in Education) inspector! All was good, we did not quite reach the heady heights of outstanding - but our inspector was very complimentary about our setting, staff and environment and understood the constraints of being small in numbers. She said we should feel very proud of ourselves; and we are. Since July 2004 to date we have had five inspections, all of them 'good' and most of the inspectors saying that we are so close to being outstanding. 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PARISH COUNCIL REPORTS OCTOBER-MARCH 2015

Shaun Morley has been detailing the work and fundraising of the Parish Council in each issue of the Finstock News. Therefore, we would like to mention only a few items in this regard.

Tenders received for this work were £260,335 - £384,766.

Bier Shed sold for £6511, less estate agent fees £513.

The Parish Council (PC) is not empowered to spend money on items such as the road to the Village Hall, which are not in their ownership. However, there will be brash left when the hall redevelopment is started and this could be deposited in the road.

The PC will continue to use the Playing

Field for four days each second weekend in September to hold an Annual Beer Festival and, they will use the Playing Field on one occasion each year in July or August for a Car Boot Sale or other fundraising event to raise money for the Village Hall Charity.

Gadden Well – Registration of Title submitted for approval. Council agrees that only the small area of the well itself to be included.

Adventure playground – various works need to be undertaken to maintain a safe playing area.

Footbridge at end of Dark Lane has been repaired.

Pumping Station Dark Lane – County has jetted the drains and put a minidigger down. They spread excavated soil over the path. The Parish Council working with the District Councillor have pursued this matter every month.

Website domain renewal – Sue Starling has complete control of the village website. Transfer of domain name <u>finstock.org.uk</u> is now complete.

Fast broadband is available in some areas of the village.

Parking off Wards Lane – the triangle grass at the top of Wards Lane is classed as roadside verge and therefore is the responsibility of OCC. Without enforcement lines being placed on the road, people can park there.

Finstock School – The Parish Council is instructing our Solicitor to proceed with the Lease with the OCC at this time. The possibility of Finstock school becoming an Academy is being considered.

TVSA – No money had been allocated for TVSA in the precept. It was agreed that this be considered a priority clause when the next precept was discussed. The Clerk presented the accounts and it was agreed that things are improving for the shop thanks to a number of donations and increased sales.

Police report – only three crimes including criminal damage, stealing of cable and a catalytic converter. A question was asked about the compound, which will be set up when work on the Village Hall is under construction. It was stated that this needs to be securely stored with metal container. Police will pay attention when visiting the village.

Planning applications - Wilcote House alterations to include new doorway and terrace to rear of dwelling and internal reconfiguration of rooms – granted conditionally by WODC 26/9/14.

Mr. C. O'Connell, 79 High Street for single storey front extension incorporating a garage and rear first floor extension. No objections.

Mr. and Mrs. Liam Braeger, 37 High Street – single storey infill side extension. Minor alteration and conversion of garage. Repositioning of existing front door. No objection.

CHARLBURY POST OFFICE THREAT OF CLOSURE

Finstock has a new Lib Dem District Councillor, Andy Graham, who joins Liz Leffman. Liz and Andy will be working together on behalf of everyone in Charlbury, Finstock and Fawler, and the first thing that they will be doing is campaigning to save the Sub-Post Office in Charlbury, which has recently been threatened with being moved to different premises and the service downgraded. If this happens it will be bad news for all of us in this area, as although Finstock has its own Post Office, the hours are limited, and many people use the Charlbury facility. At the District Council meeting on April 29th, Liz asked the Council to back the town's bid to prevent our Post Office

from being compulsorily downgraded. The District Council unanimously agreed to write to the next Post Office Minister, asking for a review of the Post Office's strategy for rural communities, and to write to the Post Office asking them to reconsider their decision to move and downgrade the service. It is vitally important that we protect our rural Post Offices; the alternative is a 10 mile round trip to Witney, which is not only costly, but also puts more traffic on our roads, which no-one wants.

SUMMERTIME

The sun and warmer days of summer brings a kaleidoscope of colour. The herbaceous border first appeared in the formal gardens of Nuneham Courtenay in the 18th century when William Mason developed the idea of arranging plants in rows with the biggest at the back and in descending height towards the front. The backdrop in my herbaceous border is the blue gorgeous majestic velvety delphiniums. In front of these, a palette of deep reds and pinks of herbaceous peonies. All are completely hardy and love our alkaline soil, fortified with farmyard manure.



Peonies embody romance and prosperity and are regarded as an omen of good fortune and a happy marriage. The Peony has a distinct history, in China, Japan, Europe and North America. They were known before 1000 BC and very popular in the imperial Gardens of China. As new dynasties began and emperors moved their courts, peonies were also moved, adding to the widespread cultivation of peonies throughout China. At the beginning of the eighth century peonies reached Japan. They were originally cultivated in Europe for their

medicinal value. It was not until much later that peonies began to be grown in Europe, solely for their ornamental qualities. Initially European gardens included only herbaceous species. It was in 1789 that the first tree peony came to Europe. Tree Peonies with exotic foliage, which make lovely flowering plants for the shrub border, covered with golds, red or yellow single flowers, others clothed with enormous double pom-poms of rich red, white orange or pink flowers.

I also love Hostas, which I surround with very sharp grit, before the spearlike growths appear, to deter hungry slugs and snails. It is a Genus of some 70 species naturally occurring in China, Korea, Japan and East Russia. Ranging from the sun-baked volcanic cliffs, the rocky stream sides, to the alpine meadows and woodlands. Numerous hybrids have now been raised in the West, providing a vast range with spectacular leaf form, and colour. The textured leaves are of every hue of green, yellow, grey-blue or variegated, followed by spikes of lilac or white flowers, some which have a gorgeous perfume. Sizes range from giant ones to very small, producing a spectacular display in many parts of the garden.

Under the tree canopy, the majestic tree ferns make a spectacular feature complemented by the shuttlecock ferns and the painted ferns with others providing lots of interesting leaf shapes in various shades of green. Happy gardening!
